Reflections on our 2023 Candle Lighting Ceremony

I am writing this the morning after our Candle Lighting Ceremony on Sunday, December 10th. This was the 27th annual ceremony for TCF. In looking at the 2024 calendar, next year will be the earliest that this ceremony can be held. It is always on the 2nd Sunday of December. You can mark your calendar for the 8th of December. We will probably hold it again at 1 pm at the First United Methodist Church.

I counted 16 pictures on the tables this year. While I consider this a nice turnout it was less than 2022. In 2022, we printed 50 programs and ran out so this year we printed 60 programs and had about half of them leftover. As families came up with their pictures and candles to light, I noted that only about 4 families in attendance were bereaved more than 10 years. Most were bereaved 5 years or less and for many it was there first or second year. As always this ceremony is very emotional and can be very draining for even of us that are long-term bereaved like Mickey and myself. This was our 19th Candle Lighting for Melissa and Emily. I can tell you it does not get easier. By the time Mickey and I arrived back home, I remarked that we had been gone almost 4 hours even though the ceremony only lasted 45 minutes. There was set-up time and the social afterwards. Plus on the trip home, we stopped at the cemetery to visit Melissa and Emily's gravesite.

I also noted that for some families in attendance this is the only time we see them during the year. Over the years some of those in attendance have either moved from the area or have also passed away and are now with their child(ren). In fact Mickey and I discussed that if we were not involved with the Chapter or in planning the ceremony, would we even attend it or would we just light a candle and do a remembrance for them at home. We honestly could not answer that question on what we would do in the future. I do remember some families that we met at past candle lighting ceremonies do not attend anymore. But that doesn't mean that they have stopped grieving for their loved ones. Perhaps they choose to celebrate in their own way. I also know of a couple of people who had family conflicts and could not attend the ceremony. Unfortunately sometimes as people say, life gets in the way of us wanting to do something.

So as we enter another new year, 2024, we hope you had a peaceful holiday season and cherish the memories of you loved ones, gone to soon.

cally changing some things and leaving other things to evolve naturally. For bereaved parents a new year marks another year on the calendar without their precious children. It is a new year, but not much has changed since the old year. Why is that?

We act as the catalysts of change for ourselves. We choose to help ourselves; we choose to stay in a specific place in our grief. We choose to reach out for hope or we choose to withdraw into the familiar and postpone facing life and hope another day. There are no set rules or specific timetables in bereavement. We are each unique in our grief.

Eventually we all find hope. We find it in different ways and in different times. There will be no one moment of epiphany for bereaved parents. Instead, there are a series of minutes, hours, weeks, months and often years until we realize that we can truly say we feel the power of hope coming alive from deep within us. This moment will come for each of us. It will come in its own time and its own way.

Even those of us who have found hope and who shine its light on the paths of newly bereaved parents, still regress and withdraw into the dark sadness of our loss. And that is as it should be. For we have lost the most precious gift of our lives...our children's presence with us and their future in this life. Our children live in our hearts and

Another New Year has slipped into our lives, radi- our memories and our dreams. They do not share this plane with us. It is normal and it is good to think of our children often and to shed some tears for all that has been lost. These aren't setbacks as much as sweet memories that bring cathartic tears.

The element we find in these memories is a closeness to our child and our child's life. This, too, is healthy. An often-expressed fear is that our children will be forgotten. Worry not, gentle parent, your child will be remembered for all of your days and for many days thereafter. You will never forget your child. Others who knew your child will never forget. The proof of this is in our memories....sweet memories that take us back to another time when our child was with us.

So this New Year's, whether you are a few months, a few years or many years in your grief, think about hope. You have not forsaken your child when you reach for hope. Your hope brings your child back in a positive way that will warm your heart. Reach for that hope. As you move forward in your grief in the New Year, reach for hope. Your child will still be with you. And one day you will find that your child's presence is sweeter when hope is within you.

The Sounds of Silence

The sounds of silence are everywhere—it is the silent pain of the loss of our son Andy, it is the silence of our home because one of our children is gone, and it is the silence of the sudden quiet that comes over people when we mention Andy.

We have become both better and worse in the six years since Andy died of cancer at the age of 22. We are better because we are able to get on with our lives and even enjoy ourselves occasionally. We have gotten worse because, as the years go by, we feel his loss more deeply.

We feel his loss every time we participate in a celebration marking some milestone of our friends and relatives or their children. We feel the loss because any celebrations of our own will always be incomplete—one person will always be absent and not there to celebrate with us or to enjoy his own milestones. The pain of his absence is always present at these events.

When Andy died, the pain of his loss was a sharp acute screaming pain that tore a hole inside of us. Now, the pain is a silent quiet steady pain. The hole is still inside us, covered by a scar, but it is still there. It doesn't scream out loud any more but instead just remains as a quiet steady and neverending ache and sadness—a silent pain.

The silence of our home is a different kind of quiet. By now, if Andy had lived, he probably would have been out on his own. We would have been "empty nesters" anyway. But, when a home becomes empty because of the death of a child, it is a different kind of empty nest. Our daughter Lesley is married and out on her own, the way it should be. But, Andy is gone for a different reason.

So, the silence of our empty nest is not the silence of knowing we raised two children and now they are both out leading their own lives. Instead it is the silence of a home that is empty because one child is gone forever—of having to deal with the reality that phone calls only come from one child, not two; that only one child stops by for a visit, not two; that one child is forever gone from the nest. There is a silence in our home that often seems to pervade every space. It is a sad silence, not the temporary quiet of a happy home.

And then, there is the silence of relatives and friends when we talk about Andy—not about his death but about the things he did while alive. It is as if Andy has become a forbidden topic because he died, as if his death wiped out the 22 years he did live. It occurs when a relative whispers that our son died when someone asked how old he was-like his life and what happened to him was a big secret. It occurs when people suddenly get a funny look on their faces and don't know what to say next when you mention something about Andy. It occurs when you get the feeling that people want to avoid you because you remind them of a horror that could happen to anyone. It is a silence that reminds you that your emotions and feelings are different from that of others and that you will always have to live with the sounds of silence resulting from your son's death.

At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us. \sim Albert Schweitzer
